

Time-lapse video shows 10 years of construction at 9/11 Memorial Museum


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EarthCam Inc. has released a gripping time-lapse video of construction at the World Trade Center site between 2004 and 2014.

The company's CEO Brian Cury said in a statement that he personally installed a camera at the site within days of the attack so the world could see the rescue and recovery effort as it unfolded. From there, came the idea of installing more cameras to capture the rebuilding.



The video's release was timed to coincide with the dedication of the 9/11 Museum on Thursday. Cury said EarthCam has donated all the images and the original camera to the museum.

"This commemorative time-lapse honors the victims of 9/11 and is dedicated to their families and friends, with special gratitude to the first responders and the steadfast construction teams," Cury wrote. "I hope this time-lapse serves as a way to recognize that for the 10 years of construction, there was constant progress made to rebuild these important 16 acres of America."
